Our May meeting discussion centered on how to continue to support members of our faith community while waiting out COVID. Here’s a quick summary of that discussion:

- We will continue with recorded and live services in the sanctuary
- The Community Care team is reaching out to the senior members of our community and offering communion. The Youth Team is working on a project called, “Soup for the Soul” to provide an easy, healthy meal and activity baskets for the homebound and elderly. If there is anyone you know who would appreciate a visit, please let Pastor Sean know.
- The AV Tech Team has purchased a special camera that allows meetings to be conducted in-house and on Zoom. This enables folks to “attend” a meeting from their home and feel as though they’re sitting in the meeting. ## **Emmanuel Community United Methodist Church, Pastor Memories**

Dear Friends,

Reflecting back to the seven years that I was in ministry with you (1972-1978) brings back many positive and joyous memories. I was part of three pastoral

appointments on staff to Emmanuel Community – that of The Rev. Dr. George E. Morris, The Rev. Robert H. Adams, Jr. and that of the Rev. H. Loren Lewis, before I transferred my credentials to the Eastern Pennsylvania Conference in 1978 because my wife, Carol, needed to be closer to New York City for opera management. I served 30 years in the E. PA Conference until I retired in 2008.

I certainly want to acknowledge the other associates on staff at that time who were central in our working relationship: Ms. Shirley Clement, Ms. Marilyn Clark, and Mrs. Theo Amenda, in Christian Education. Each made their own unique contribution in what we were able to achieve in those years for Christ and the growth of the church. A few years following my ministry with you, other members of Emmanuel Community soon felt Christ's call in a special way and completed their seminary requirements including Ms. Gena Garton, Mrs. Gloria Cavit, and Mrs. Christal French Bindrich. All speaks of your devotion in the service of our Lord and Savior to inspire and strengthen the church's mission in the world.

A few highlights of my years with you include: the development of a small group support ministry meeting weekly in members' homes, the strengthening of your youth ministry and their work project outreach to the Menominee Indian Tribe in Keshena and Neopit through the able assistance of The Rev. Jim and Leita Feay, and then further north to the Ojibwe Tribe in Lac du Flambeau during my last two years with you. All remain endearing memories with our advance visits by the leadership team of youth and adults to potential repair home sites in the January-February frozen cold to determine the early summer work projects. Remember, this outreach ministry was our effort to make homes warmer, dryer and safer for the individual residents and families, as well to bring the warmth of Christ's love to their communities. With the youth ministry we also implemented an individualized and self-directed Confirmation program to accommodate busy school and family schedules.

The music ministry of Emmanuel Community UMC always remained central to your worship life and for me, a special remembrance. This included the recording of a long-play audio album of some of the Chancel Choir favorites. Leadership at the pipe organ included talented musicians like Walter Weber and Irene Perrin, as well as Gary Streiff, and Karen Johnson. Bob Meyer, director of the

Chancel Choir, always shared of himself willingly to accomplish outstanding results Sunday after Sunday and during the special sacred holiday celebrations.

To this I would add that during my time with you the spiritual and political climate was always in the forefront with the ending of the Viet Nam War, the Watergate scandal, and the controversy over "Sophia" and the language of the Godhead.

Above all, I do recall with affection the generosity, willingness and personal sacrifice of the many members who contributed to whatever gains were made during those seven years for the advancement of God's love in Christ Jesus for a broken and hurting world. In reflection, Emmanuel Community UMC was and always will hold a very special place in my life and spirit. It was where my pastoral ministry became more sharply focused and deepened for the remainder of my pastoral years and decades of service through the United Methodist Church. I owe you a great debt of gratitude.

Finally, in my last two years with you I was supported by your Staff Parish Relations Committee and encouraged to engage in continuing education opportunities with Dr. John Burton through G-ETS (Garrett Evangelical Theological Seminary) to become a clinical member (1976) of AAMFT (The American Association for Marriage and Family Therapy). Several years later, while serving a local UMC in Philadelphia, I completed an additional three-year course of training (1985) with PFPC (Pennsylvania Foundation of Pastoral Counseling), as a Pastoral Psychotherapist.

In closing, I congratulate you on this memorable occasion and wish you all the very best in the coming decades ahead. In these continuing, trying times of abuse and physical violence run amuck in our nation and world, always keep in mind that "God is love" (I John 4:8) above all!

## 175 years of music at Emmanuel Community

Music has been a major aspect of the worship experience since our church was founded 175 years ago. Nothing will stir our souls like a favorite hymn. It is something we can always turn to

when we need inspiration or comfort and these songs of faith will bring back memories. So, try it, close your eyes and think about a familiar hymn or song. We can remember many songs of faith right away, not to mention the number of Christmas favorites that we have to sing during the advent and Christmas season. Not to mention the glorious hymns of Easter, so yes, music has, is, and always will be an integral part of our worship experience.

Since our founding in 1846, there have been many variations on our main musical resource, the hymnal. In the early days of the congregation, there were no notes in the hymnal (these are known as hymn tunes) only the words, the hymns, that are sung and guide our beliefs. Eventually, 1878 or so, we started adding some musical notes to the hymnal and hymns within to help us read the notes. Eventually all the hymns were written with the hymn tunes and harmonization to make congregational singing easier.

John Wesley had directions for singing and these directions can still be found in the beginning of our hymnal. There are seven of them and briefly they are:

- Learn these tunes before you learn any others; afterwards learn as many as you please.
- Sing them exactly as they are written here without altering or mending them at all; and if you have learned to sing them otherwise, unlearn it as soon as you can.
- Sing all. See that you join with the congregation as frequently as you can. Let not a slight degree of weakness or weariness hinder you. If it is a cross to you, take it up, and you will find it a blessing.
- Sing lustily and with good courage. Beware singing as if you were half dead or half asleep; but lift up your voice with strength.
- Sing Modestly. Do not bawl, so as to be heard above or distinct from the rest of the congregation, that you may not destroy the harmony; but strive to unite your voices together, so as to make one clear melodious sound.
- Sing in time. Whatever time is sung be sure to

keep with it. Do not run before nor stay behind it; but attend close to the leading voices, and move therewith as exactly as you can; and take care not to sing too slow.

Above all sing spiritually. Have an eye to God in every word you sing. Aim at pleasing him more than yourself, or any other creature.

At Emmanuel we are blessed with many musical groups, music leaders, pianists, organists, and volunteers all willing to share the talents given to them for the glory of God. We currently have two children's music groups, SLAMM (Serving the Lord And Making Music) and JAMM (Jesus And Me Musically), a youth handbell group (Rainbow Ringers), an adult handbell group (Spirit Ringers), A women's Choir, a Men's Choir, our Chancel Choir, The Sunshine Singers (small group) and brass group, along with musicians willing to provide special music or add percussion to a musical number. These musicians are all adding to the worship experience and growing their faith through music.

As we look back at some of our recent musical history, we have taken the music of our congregation and have participated in many different musical events both inside and outside of our church walls such as a mass handbell choir with multiple handbell groups all playing at the same time, a Men's choir festival where many churches gather together to share an afternoon of music and fellowship. Our Children's music has produced multiple musicals and Christmas programs to help our younger musicians grow in their faith. Our Sunshine Singers have sung in many retirement settings and community events, bringing God's message through song. Our Chancel choir has been involved with an annual multi-denominational mass choir event sponsored by the LARCUM (Lutheran, Anglican, Roman Catholic, United Methodist and United Church of Christ) for over ten years and in 2018 Emmanuel's musicians produced their final Choir Dinner Show after a successful 26-year run. All of the musical groups help us celebrate with a special Sunday of music for both the Christmas and Easter seasons. I am sure I am missing some events here, but, again we have been blessed with people willing to share their talents and time.

As I write this today, we are just on the verge of re-opening our church safely after the COVID-19 pandemic. We are looking forward to a bright future where we will continue to raise our voices to sing praise, love, and adoration to God and celebrate our risen savior, Jesus Christ.

## What Emmanuel Community UMC means to Me Bonnie Falk 2021



My roots with EC-UMC precede my birth. My maternal grandfather, Rev. Henry J. Beck pastored this congregation (then Evangelical) at the Red Brick Church by the cemetery on Appleton Av, from 1926-1928. Richfield and Colgate were also on the circuit. My mother was about 12 then, youngest of four and told frequent stories of her clergy father.



Grandfather was a German immigrant, and at the time, Evangelical Theological Seminary in Naperville, IL (now Garrett Ev. Theological)

had a unique educational program for immigrants. He therefore received his college and seminary degrees simultaneously. I only know him through stories my mother shared, as he died when I was just 3 years old. To honor his memory, and the 175th Anniversary of this church, I joined the Anniversary Committee in 2019.

I became a member in 1997, when my husband Rev. Wesley Falk, was appointed by the Bishop to serve here. The snowy January evening of his Staff Parish interview, we saw the 150th Anniversary booklet on the table which was celebrated in 1996. I was delighted to see Rev. Henry J. Beck's name listed as a former pastor of Emmanuel. Coming to a church that my Clergy grandfather had served and being closer to

family helped mitigate my sorrow about leaving my much loved position as an Oncology Nurse Clinician at Marshfield Cancer Center in central WI. Wes was serving as NC District Superintendent with the parsonage in Stevens Point, an 80 mile round trip commute for me to Marshfield for work. As Clergy spouses do, I would readjust, find a new job, and come to know the worrisome move became a real blessing.

### The Camp Meeting Tradition

A unique part of my youth memories and the Evangelical Association history, is the Wisconsin Camp Meetings in Lomira, my hometown. My grandfather Beck was pastor of a three charge circuit around Lomira when my parents met in school, later married & raised our family.

(In the 1950s Lomira's population was 800)

In 1853, some people came 35 miles on foot from Menomonee Falls to Camp meetings at Lomira to worship in improvised shelters/tents. Three families came from Princeton, 60 miles north, by oxcart and others later by train, horse & buggy, then automobiles.

In 1905 the camp meeting association of Fond du Lac and Milwaukee Districts were united, and Lomira was designated as the summer meeting place. Services continued in tents until a tabernacle seating 1200, was constructed in 1906, along with three dormitories, dining halls, educational buildings, office buildings and 16 private cottages...all of which I remember as a child and youth. Our local church held summer Bible School and worship in the tabernacle as well. Many summer weeks, revival services were held with visiting preachers and rousing choral music. After services, we kids had fun digging through the sawdust floor under the pews for lost coins...later placed in the offering of course.

In 1957( after 104 years of EUB Camp meetings) the grounds were sold to the Wisconsin Conference who relocated to Camp Lucerne, Waushara County, with new facilities and on a beautiful lake, becoming a meaningful Spiritual growth place for United Methodist of all ages. The former Camp Grounds is the home of Trinity UMC.
