Pastoral Letter

Church's call to Christian Discipleship-Reflection, Part II

(A continuation of my reflection from last Pathways)

While we are preparing for schools to recommence, for new activities to begin in the church, and for the beginning of Fall, let me invite you to engage in a spiritual reflection on maturing ourselves as disciples of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Disciple as "Alter Christus"- Another Christ

We are called to be "*Alter Christus"* in our society.

Disciples should carry the cross. "Then Jesus said to his disciples, 'Whoever wants to be my disciple must *deny themselves* and take up their cross and follow me,'" (Matthew 16:24, NIV; emphasis mine). As we can clearly see, *renunciation of the self* is emphasized here. Furthermore, it is a call to radical commitment for the OTHER. I invite you to discern who the OTHER is for you in your context. Christians see Christ in the OTHER, engages Christ in OTHERS, and even is ready to be transformed by the Christ in OTHERS. This requires humility and discernment; it is important to remember that we are also another Christ in God's world.

As disciples we are called to discern the will of the Abba, the Father. Jesus prayed, "My Father, if it is possible, may this cup be taken from me. Yet not as I will, but as you will... My Father, if it is not possible for this cup to be taken away unless I drink it, may your will be done," (Matthew 26:39 & 42, NIV). Doing the will of God, rendering obedience to God, saying yes to God, is what self-denial is all about. John the Baptist's spirituality is worth mentioning here, especially when he said, "He [Christ] must become greater; I must become less," (John 3:30, NIV). The Apostle Paul shares a similar sentiment in his letter to the church in Galatia, where he said, "I no longer live, but Christ lives in me. The life I now live in the body, I live by faith in the Son of God," (Galatians 2:20b, NIV).

This is not only a principle found in the Biblical authors, but in the lives of the saints, martyrs, pastors, and teachers of the Church down through the centuries. Take the martyr Dietrich Bonheoffer, who lived during the time

of Adolf Hitler in Germany during the Second World War. He was tested in his witness and wrote about how costly discipleship was. He denounced "cheap grace" and announced the **cost of discipleship** for those who want to follow Christ. By doing so, Bonheoffer and his companions affirmed that Jesus, not Hitler, is Lord. Another example is Elisabeth Fiorenza, a New Testament scholar, who speaks of a **discipleship of equals** in the context of men and women, clergy and laity, and affirms that we are called to a common and corporate discipleship in the ministry of Christ. Fr. Michael Rodrigo, a Sri Lankan martyr, describes the "disciple" as a living sacrifice **and offering** for the people who are suffering. This is the ultimate Eucharistic offertory to God, for this discipleship is also a call to a Passover-Easter experience: a Passover from selfishness to selflessness, from ignorance to wisdom, from death to life. John Stott, a contemporary theologian, explains the "nonconformity" in discipleship; that we are called to live, serve, and witness in the world but to avoid becoming contaminated by the world. These reflections are intended to be helpful and thought-provoking exercise, so that we learn various aspects of discipleship.

In light of our 175 years as the ECUMC community, let us re-commit ourselves to the **costly discipleship of Christ** in these changing and challenging times. The fruits of our church's labor will be tested and grow when Jesus's followers, in our local community and ministries, come face to face with REAL LIFE. Our discipleship is tested and our faith grows when we encounter crisis and conflict situations; when injustice in the social order is challenged by righteousness; when we meet the least, the last, and the lost in our communities; when we have to make choices between the riches of the world and the blessings of God's reign.

Yesterday is gone. Tomorrow has not yet come. We have only today. Let us begin.

Community Quest (CQ)

CQ for Children:

<u>SLaMM and JaMM Music Programs:</u> Preschool through 5th-grade children will spend the first 15 minutes of CQ singing and making music. Threeyear-old through 1st-grade children meet in the Ark Park (attached to the nursery), and 2nd- to 5thgrade children meet in the Adult Choir Room across from Celebration Hall.

<u>Preschool</u>: 3- and 4-year-old children will meet in Jesus' Place with dedicated teachers. Children will explore the same Bible stories as their older siblings each week and participate in hands-on activities to help them begin to feel the power of Jesus' love.

<u>Weekly Intergenerational CQ for 5K to 5th-grade</u> <u>students (and adults who prefer a weekly</u> <u>intergenerational experience)</u>: Children and adults will meet together in Fellowship Hall for hands-on lessons. A repetitive approach will allow students to explore each Bible Story from multiple angles. Hands-on lessons in cooking, drama and puppetry, crafts, games, AV tech, and storytelling will bring biblical concepts to life and allow adults and children to form lasting relationships. Adults attending will have 15 minutes to enjoy coffee and fellowship while children attend choir rehearsal.

Middle School Crossroads (6th-8th) &

High School Tribe (9th–12th): Meet together in the Youth Room to wrestle with an opening question and listen to scripture before dividing into two groups for deeper discussion and fun with friends. Leaders will provide meaningful, engaging programs to help youth know Jesus more, know God's word more, and apply this to their daily lives.

Adult CQ: Two drop-in groups available for adult discussion meet in Chapel Lounge and the room next to Chapel Lounge. Offerings can be found under "Discipleship Ministries" in *Pathways* and on the church website.

2nd Sunday Intergenerational CQ: All preschool through adult classes will be suspended on second Sundays to allow for Intergenerational CQ. Meet in Celebration Hall at 9:30 and be prepared to enjoy lessons, activities, and fellowship with four generations of church friends. We'll continue the FAITH5 approach in order to give plenty of time to meet and catch up with church friends in an informal setting.

Take a load off your mind! A note from Finance Committee

We've all had those times when we didn't get that check to the church written and delivered (no time, no stamp, no envelope, didn't attend this week). Perhaps you are looking for a more convenient way to stay current on your commitment to support the programs at Emmanuel. If so, consider the convenience and security of going online.

- EFT—Call the church office and get the details for how to set up a recurring EFT "pull" from your checking account monthly.
- Vanco—To pay your commitment through a credit or debit card, click on the "give now" button on the church website and register your card for Vanco to charge your card with your commitment amount.
- Bill Pay app—If either of those options are a little too open-ended for you, here's a third option that I use. I've set up Emmanuel as a bill pay payee with my credit union to "push" my monthly support to Emmanuel. It gives me the feeling of being more in control of when the money goes out. If you are already using a

bill pay app for your regular monthly bills, consider adding Emmanuel to your list of payees. You are in charge of deciding the timing, frequency, and amount of the payment. Give it a try. I'm sure you'll agree it's convenient and mind-relieving. Jan Kohlmann

Church Council Notes

The Church Council met on Monday, August 16, to discuss the business of the church and to hear about the amazing work that Pastor Lynne Hines-Levy is doing at Summerfield Church in downtown Milwaukee. Members of our church community work with Pastor Lynne and other volunteers to prepare meals for folks that find themselves homeless. Her ministry has grown from serving nutritional meals on Saturday nights to four times a week for 40-75 or more souls. Their money goes directly to the feeding programs; she feels that their people are more important than brick and mortar. When the other programs in town shut down, they ramped up from in-person feeding lines to carryout meals. Others have seen the work they are doing and are helping them with hygiene kits, clothing, food, and assistance where needed. They've made great progress with developing a trusting relationship with the homeless community through prayer and loving their neighbors.

We discussed how we could apply what we've learned in our ministry programs to help support Pastor Lynne's mission and raise awareness of this growing population of folks that need our prayers.

On the business side, we have decided to move the Ministry Team meeting to the fourth Monday of the month so that our leaders can share what they've learned during Church Council with their teams. An updated Safety Policy has been posted on our website for your review. Information on the upcoming Jubilee Celebration and Sunday morning schedule can be found within *Pathways*.

Next month a young woman who grew up in our church, Tamra Schneider, will be sharing her journey to becoming a missionary with us. If you're interested in Zooming in, let me know and I'll send you the link.

Youth Mission Trips

John Wesley is famously quoted as wanting "the whole world for my mission field" and the United Methodist Church and ECUMC have embodied that sentiment over the years.

Remember

Within 30 years of Wesley's death, Methodist and Evangelical United Brethren denominations established missionary outreach boards in the U.S. Because of the U.S. Civil War and the preceding north/south tensions, overseas work did not begin in earnest until later. In both denominations, women took the lead in establishing missionary societies and sending women missionaries to start educational and medical institutions.

Our denomination has always worked in concert with other denominations and is noteworthy for its strong commitment to encouraging church leadership by the local peoples. The arc of this missions commitment has resulted in over 12.5 million United Methodists in over 136 countries today.

In 1971, ECUMC church leaders began to organize youth missions trips committed to service. Since that first large youth mission trip (with the Appalachian Service Project) to date there have been approximately 35 youth mission trips.



Cindy Morgan attended several these trips as a youth and recalls how the love of missions was formed by ECUMC.

I remember the excitement and enthusiasm in 1971 as the congregation sent them off to Kentucky on the church bus christened "The Disciple." I knew I wanted to experience this for myself when in high school.

In the summer of 1973, I took part in the youth work mission in Keshena, Wisconsin, serving families of the Menominee Reservation. We held fundraising events including bake sales, rent-a-youth, selling homemade pizzas, and a walk-a- thon. Approximately 80 youth and adults set up operations from several rustic buildings at the Keshena fairgrounds. During the week, crews painted homes and a school, repaired roofs, and built a bathroom addition. Client families and other community members often joined our evening devotions, singing, praying, and sharing together. Friendships were built and strengthened.



During my four mission trips, I had the privilege of working under the guidance of inspiring adults like John Eldredge, Roger Jones, and Collier Good. Dedicated moms including LuAnn Jones, Dorothy Nienow, Jean Adams, and Jeannette King prepared enough food to feed an army and delivered daily lunches to each of the work sites. A favorite lunchtime treat was a 3 lb. coffee can of homemade cookies donated by church members. The love, skills, knowledge, and patience of these adults is something I will always remember and appreciate.

These opportunities set a path for my life of helping others in need. Experiencing and engaging with people of a different culture and seeing poverty first-hand was something foreign to me and took me outside my comfortable life. Relationships with the youth, adult leaders, and our pastors, Paul Gutknecht and Bob Adams, were strengthened by seeing them outside the church walls putting words into action. Thank you Emmanuel Community UMC for giving me the opportunity to participate in such meaningful and lifechanging experiences. A special thanks to the many adults who understood the importance of youth involvement in work missions and made it a reality for so many of us. Cindy Morgan

Roger Jones, a longtime leader of youth mission trips, recalls those years. LuAnn Jones was impressed by Rev. Jim Feay, a United Methodist missionary to the Menominee Indians and then Menominee Tribe in Keshena had been swindled out of their tribe status in exchange for small cash payments and as a result they had a deep distrust of any white folks. Roger recalls Emma and Mike, an elderly couple living in a decrepit home. As the team put in windows, reroofed, wired the home for electricity, and delivered an outhouse, Mike kept asking what all this was going to cost. At the end of the week, Roger provided a receipt that read "paid in full." Rev. Feay reported Mike couldn't get over this kindness and his great joy because there was no "catch." It was a free gift of service and love when it was never expected.

Rejoice

Over the years, ECUMC youth have served from Florida to Denver and in Canada, Guatemala and Honduras. Every single youth who goes on a mission trip finds a path to the deeper meaning of faith in action. They are changed. As Cindy testifies, their eyes are opened to needs of others who are different, to the joy of working together, and to the power of service in Jesus' name. Roger and many other leaders continued to serve on mission trips working to rebuild after Katrina and other disasters.

Re-engage

The youth mission trips involve hours and hours of planning, fundraising and support by all church members. Whether it is buying poinsettias, bidding \$30 for bedazzled flip flops at a youth mission auction, donating funds to provide mission trip scholarships or praying for those called to serve on these trips, support for youth mission draws us together. Past Pastoral Memories Pastor Jane Haass 1986-1994

In 1986 I decided to take a leave of absence from pastoral ministry to be home

full-time with our kids. I'm glad I did, but I still missed serving a church. When Emmanuel Community offered a part-time position in Christian Education I applied and was accepted. It was an ideal position for me.

I started working 5 weeks after Andrew was born. I had a crib in my office so there were times I could be there and work while still watching Andrew, and my 22-month-old daughter, Amy, was in daycare just down the hallway from my office. The Christian Education position fit all the church's and my needs. I enjoyed immensely being responsible for all the education programs which included Sunday school for all ages, Vacation Bible School, intergenerational events, and youth work.

When Rev. Tom Countryman left to serve another church, it was decided I would also take on more pastoral duties, which included preaching once a month, teaching Bible studies, visitation, and conducting funerals and weddings. I had already been fulfilling some of those responsibilities before with my pastoral experiences in previous churches at Colgate and Madison, so I felt competent in these areas. In my years of serving at Emmanuel Community, I learned a lot and my faith and confidence grew.

I'll never forget walking into Pastor Lynn's office one morning and telling him I was expecting another baby. He threw his hands up and shouted out, "Holy Hay." He was rather shocked because at that time, Andrew was 24 months and Amy not quite 4. But Pastor Lynn being Pastor Lynn, quickly hugged and congratulated me. He was very happy for both Randy and me when Matthew came into our family. I will always remember Pastor Lynn as being the wonderful and dedicated pastor he was, and a true mentor for me. Serving Emmanuel Community for almost my whole time with Pastor Lynn, was an excellent experience. Vida and their kids were very special to me as well.

One time I was preaching and my 2year-old Amy ran up to the pulpit and gave me a hug and she wouldn't let go. It took quite a bit of coaxing to get her to go back to her seat. I was a little worried what Rev. Don Ott, who was the District Superintendent at the time, would think of my daughter interrupting the service, but he was smiling and chuckling with all the others. I was relieved and grateful for serving such a caring and loving congregation. I so appreciated the congregation's patience and understanding as I tried to be the best wife, mother, and pastor as I could be. Emmanuel Community felt strongly that my priorities in life were to be first: God, second: family, and third: church.

Our kids were 6, 8, and 10 when we left Emmanuel Community. In those years our kids truly learned and experienced how much God loved them because of how much their church family shared God's love with them. It took several years before our kids could warm up to another congregation. It was hard in many ways for Randy and me as well.

The kids are all in their 30s now and still talk about how much Emmanuel Community meant to them. Our whole family will remember their "church in the falls," as a Christ-like church where people were compassionate, understanding, accepting, and committed to spreading God's love not only to our family, but also to each other and into the community and world. Their ministry was to witness not just with their words but also their actions. I trust God is still leading Emmanuel Community in spreading the gospel of Jesus Christ to others.
