Pastoral Letter

Reflections on the Season of Creation 2021

What does it mean for the Church to be a Home for All?

In the beginning of the Bible – way back in Genesis 1 – God created the heavens and the Earth, the spiritual and material universes, and everything in them, and he called them very good. Often when we read this poem that opens the Bible, we focus on the act of creation itself; there was nothing and then there were a lot of things. And these things ranged from atoms, to molecules, to liquids, gasses, plasmas, and solids, to bacteria, to vegetation, to animals, to humans, to angels, to planets, asteroids, moons, stars, and other celestial bodies, to black holes, to galaxies, and on out to the ever-expanding edge of the universe. All of this is wonderful, a marvelous expression of God's power, creativity, and action.

However, it is not enough to notice that God made a multitude of things – awesome though that is. No, we also need to notice that he gave everything a place, purpose, and function within the collective whole of his creation. Strong and weak nuclear forces hold energy into atoms, this produces gravity as a constituent element of space-time in which all material creation lives. Within that framework stars, planets, and other astronomical bodies can run their courses through space in a largely orderly fashion. This, in turn, allowed for there to be life on Earth: first micro-organisms, then plants, animals, and finally humans. The system of creation as a whole – with each and every creature from subatomic particles to galaxies possessing their own function and contribution to the whole – is just as impressive as the act of creation itself. Perhaps more so. And so we end up with a pair of foci – *being* (things God created) and *working* (how those creations work together in relative harmony).

This same pairing – being and working – can also be found within the life of the Church. When we think of welcoming people to the Emmanuel or of our being members here, what do we mean by that? Do we mean that we *are* members, or that we *have* places for visitors to sit – a statement of being? Or do we mean that we act as a community, each of us – members and visitors – having our own place and our own ministry to build up the life of the whole Church – a statement of working?

The apostle Paul described the Church

as the body of Christ, saying, "For just as each of us has one body with many members, and these members do not all have the same function, so in Christ we, though many, form one body, and each member belongs to all the others. We have different gifts, according to the grace given to each of us," (Romans 12:4-6a, NIV). This means that each and every one of us is called not only to *be* a member of the Church, but to *live and act* as a part of the body of Christ. This means three things for us (two for us as the Church and one for each of us as individuals):

As the Church – we need to provide opportunities for people to express their gifts and graces for the benefit of the whole Church.

As the Church – we need to allow people to do their ministry without interfering; even if we think they are doing it wrong or that we could do it better: they have their ministry, we have ours, and we need to respect that.

As Individuals – we need to listen for God's call on our lives, to hear what he wants us to do, and then to find a way to do it here in Emmanuel. Everyone has a call from God to serve the Church in some way – there are no exceptions – we just need to listen to what that call is and then to follow it.

Just as in the beginning God created many individual things – from the microscopic to the cosmic – and each functions in harmony with the rest, so, too, does God call each and every human person to be a member of his Church and also to minister to and serve within the body of Christ as a whole. This takes work, energy, adaptability, innovation, and change. But it is only within this buzz of activity that the Church and its members can truly be alive as the body of Christ, just as it is only through movement and growth that the universe can exist as the wonderland that God created it to be.

So as we move on from the Season of Creation – 2021, I invite you to reflect on how *you* are called by God to move within the waltz that is the community life of Emmanuel Community UMC, as well as how you can assist others in doing the same.

Community Banquet is back!

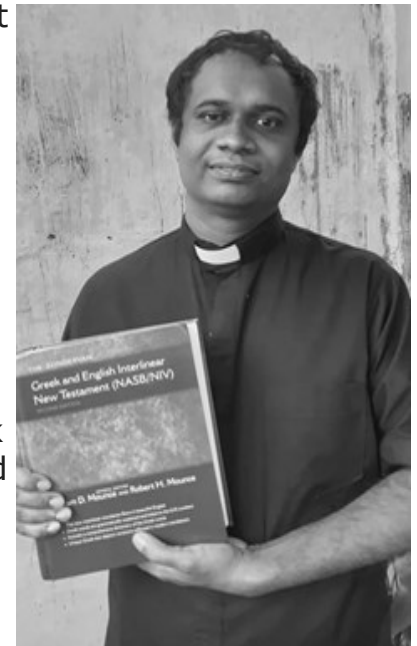

Doing Life with Your Adult Children

Come for reassurance or commiseration! Come to compare notes and share wisdom! Let's support one another as those who have "graduated" from the day-to-day caring for our children, but still know that the caring never stops.

This four-week study will be a casual time of conversation around issues faced by all of us with adult or almost-adult children. Held four Saturdays this fall the sessions are stand-alone – attend as many as you'd like.

In *Doing Life with Your Adult Children: Keep Your Mouth Shut & the Welcome Mat Out*, Dr. Jim Burns offers practical advice and hopeful encouragement for those parenting grown children such as:

- What's the difference between enabling and helping?
- What boundaries should I have if my child moves back home?
- How do I relate to my grown child's significant other?

- As a grandparent, what will be my legacy?
- How can I support my adult kids when I don't support their values?

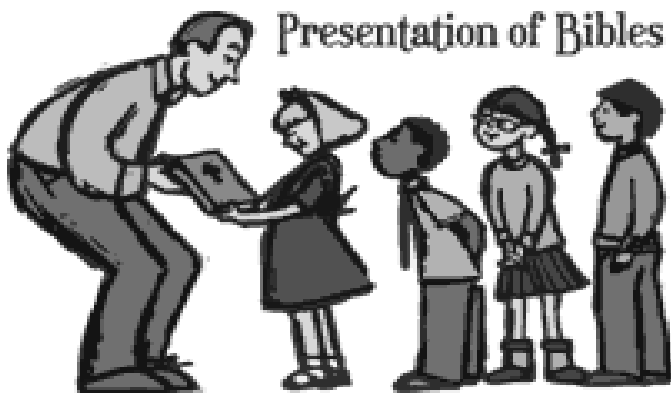

Confrontation, Conflict and Change

Remember

The Scriptures reveal that Jesus' life and teaching was radically controversial. He confronted and challenged the established leadership of the church, and they taunted and tested Him. He spent his ministry reaching out to poor, marginalized and despised persons, something no religious leader of the day would ever have done.

In the early Christian church Jews who became followers of Christ doubted the legitimacy of Greeks/gentiles to participate in the church. Paul weighed into this deep controversy of whether uncircumcised persons (the Greeks) should be allowed into the early church or excluded. He said, "For in Christ Jesus neither circumcision nor uncircumcision has any value. All that matters is faith, expressed through love." Galatians 5:6

In 1633 Galileo was condemned as "vehemently suspected of heresy" by the Roman Catholic church for advancing the theory that the sun, and not the earth, was the center of the solar system. Established church doctrine at the time insisted that the Holy Bible confirmed this "known truth" citing Psalm 93:1, 96:10; 1 Chronicles 16:30; Psalm 104:5 and other passages. At that time to suggest otherwise was contrary to the word of God. For his expressed scientific observations, Galileo died under house arrest, separated from the church. This particular historic conflict of science over established Biblical interpretation has long been laid to rest, but the tension between what we think we know to be true and what we think we know "the Bible says," remains a source of conflict to this day.

Our own denomination broke apart over the conflict of slavery and emancipation. In 1785 the Methodist denomination explicitly called for the emancipation of slaves. In 1808 it watered down its stance on slavery by calling for "gradual emancipation." By 1840 ours was the largest denomination in the United States, but by then individual churches were allowed to make their own rules on the buying and selling of slaves. Thousands of northern Methodists had left the church over this conflict, when the issue came to a head in 1844. The northern churches objected to the election of a slave-holding bishop at general conference, and they won the vote to reject his leadership. Southern Methodists strongly disagreed with abolition as a fundamental tenet of the church. A committee was appointed to negotiate the acrimonious "divorce" and the denomination split apart. It was not until almost a hundred years later that it was reunited, and even then, the denomination retained a segregated black conference until 1968.

Rejoice

What is to rejoice about uncertainty, confrontation and conflict?

First, Jesus didn't shy away from conflict or strife. In fact, he gathered people around him who had diametrically differing opinions. Two of his chosen disciples were Simon the Zealot, part of a group advocating the forceful overthrow of the Roman government, and Matthew, a tax collector who was an active member of the Roman establishment. Surely, they had some contentious conversations! But their love of the Master and their belief in the mission united them under a common banner. That love of Jesus continues to unite us, too, even as we acknowledge our differences, big or small.



Jesus constantly shows the way of abiding love and grace.

Second, when we remember the history of past conflicts resolved, we can be assured that God keeps working in the world despite our feelings of fear, mistrust, or hurt. We can have confidence in God's healing power this and every day. We celebrate all that we can agree on, even when we don't agree on everything.

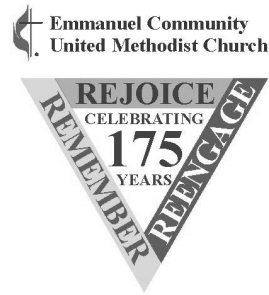
Re-engage

The Jubilee is a time to ask ourselves what does to mean to be a follower of Christ in a world filled with conflict and controversy? How do we engage with each other within the church and with those we meet who might be yearning for faith or condemning it? If we want to imitate Christ, we cannot turn away from conflict or disagreement.

Methodists have a rich tradition of "holy conferencing," in which every voice is heard and given equal weight. God is not impressed by the majority but rather with kingdom-building "on earth as in heaven." When we engage with each other around divisive topics, it should never mean there will be a winner or a loser. How can we take a side against another when we are all valued and loved children of God?

Instead, we can do our best to engage with "faith, expressed through love." When we don't agree, we can disagree in a way that still honors our God and makes provision for us to continue wait upon His clarity and to imitate Christ together for the next 175 years.

The United Brethren branch of our United Methodist denomination took a strong stance against slavery in 1820 and never wavered. Celebrate our Jubilee by the Gift of Education

- ♦ Remember our past and our heritage of faith
- ♦ Rejoice that we are still here and God is still working in our midst

These are the themes of our 175th Jubilee Celebration Year. They compel us to ask, "How can we continue to be salt and light in a world that has changed dramatically, even over the last 25 years?" The answer is a **gift of love through scholarships** for young people whose dreams of formal education after high school have greater challenges.

Between now and November, we hope to raise at least \$4,500 in donations to provide post-secondary scholarships of \$1,000 to students of limited financial resources in local high schools and who practice and encourage building community between races, religions and different backgrounds.

The ECUMC Endowment fund will match all donations, dollar for dollar up to \$4,500, to create at least 9 scholarships for seniors graduating in 2022.

With these scholarships we hope to create awareness in our local communities of our family of faith at ECUMC, its commitment to education and to economic and racial justice and radical inclusion.

The scholarships will be announced to local high schools with the following criteria for applicants:

- ♦ A first-generation student attending a two- or four-year college
- ♦ Financial need
- ♦ Exhibits the character trait of actively building community among people of different backgrounds, races, and faiths

- ♦ Recommendations from two adults who have observed the above character trait
- ♦ Applicant's short statement about how to build a community that rejoices in differences among people and cares for all

Bill and Suzanne Gay will lead the small committee to select the recipients from among the applicants.

Checks for this gift should state "Jubilee Scholarships" in the memo line. Please consider a gift of any amount of support to reach this goal for our 175th Jubilee!

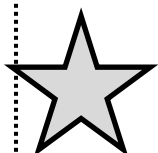
