#### PASTORAL MESSAGE

#### Lord, Bind us Together in Love

To my mind, Christ invites us to partner in his mission—the mission of *KOINONIA*; unity and fellowship, solidarity and communion of the church in these challenging times.

Let's discuss why we should be working toward koinonia with the Lord?

- We are called to be a Trinitarian community: As the Father, the Son, and Holy Spirit are ONE, we are called to be one body and one people of God. We are called to live in harmony and peace, as well as to overcome all of the evil, division, and fragmentation that the world has created. We praise our Father, we follow Jesus the Christ, and we are empowered by the Holy Spirit to create a BELOVED community.
- We are called to be the ONE organic body of Christ: Within the diversity of the body of Christ, koinonia is both a gift and a calling; we are formed into a new creation as both one and many (2 Cor 5.17), a creation born of the reconciling Power of Christ.
- We are called to sow the seeds of Koinonia: A lesson we learn from the early Christian community is that they prayed together and worshiped together, they broke bread together, they evangelized others together, and they shared food and everything they had together. The basis of all of that is LOVE.

When we do all of these things, we are following Christ's commandments to live in unity and love.

During my 27 years of ordained ministry, here are some of the things I have learned and shared with others-things related to unity, togetherness, and koinonia.

- 1. Unity cannot be built through human efforts alone. It will fail miserably. Human uniformity can lead to Babel towers. Unity is God's desire. Unity is His gift and grace.
- 2. Forgiveness is fundamental for unity and togetherness so that we all grow in Christ's love and forgiveness, offering them to others. "There is no future without forgiveness." Nelson Mandela
- 3. Respect and honor diversity: Christ accepts and loves people from all walks of life, irrespective of person's color, caste, class, educational background, intellect, gender and sexual orientation. We have to accept diverse ways of doing things, including diverse leadership styles. We promote unity in diversity and diversity in unity, not uniformity.
- 4. To test the caliber of the community, determine how that community treats the weakest and the lowest, the last and the least in that community. Remember that a Samaritan person reached out to the weakest in that moment (while being a marginalized community member himself). He helped to build relationships and inspired service with sacrifice, healing the world for generations to come.
- 5. Be a peacemaker at all times. Jesus said, "Blessed are the artisans of Peace, for they shall be called children of God." I hope you want to be children of God.
- 6. Respect dissent. The simplest wise saying would be, "In Christ, we agree to disagree, respect one another, and accept all in love."

My prayer is - Lord help ECUMC to welcome and affirm all God's children!

God's vison is the Koinonia of all creation: It is called SHALOM ! Let's build this just by doing our part. Let's pray for it; we need that today.

Greetings to my new friends in Menomonee Falls!

I am excited to begin engaging in mission and ministry with all of you. What an honor it is to be appointed to serve Emmanuel Community United Methodist Church! Ours is a church with a long track record of faithful witness to the love and grace of Jesus Christ. Some of you have been at the heart of this for decades while others are new to the community. Some may be hurting in this season of transition, others may be excited. New and old, hurting or excited, we will move forward together.

Over the years, I have served small and large churches. I received my Master's of Divinity in 1996. In 2009 with the support of the church I was serving at the time, I completed my Doctor of Ministry degree in "Preaching for the 21<sup>st</sup> Century" from Wesley Theological Seminary in Washington DC. I am grateful for so many positive experiences and lessons that I can now bring with me to walk and to work with you.

My first weekend in worship with you will be July 9. I encourage you to invite someone to come to worship with you. This may be uncomfortable for you, so I am going to help you. We know that researchers have found that one of the main reasons people are hesitant to invite someone to be a guest at their church is fear of being embarrassed by what their friends might experience. Will the music be terrible? Will the pastor be able to deliver a relevant message that feeds the soul? From everything I have heard and I am sure you have witnessed personally, we know the music is going to be wonderful, so let's address the preaching. The truth is you don't know if the sermon is going to be good. This takes all of the pressure off of you. You can invite your neighbors, friends, or family members by saying, "Our new pastor is preaching this weekend. We don't know if he's any good, would you like to come and check it out with me?" If the sermon is bad you won't need to apologize. But, if the sermon is relevant and meaningful for your guest then you will have offered a blessing to their soul.

Together we are called to do the important work of, *"Imitating Christ Together."* This is our mission. It is why we exist. May God bless us all as we faithfully live this out in new and exciting ways.

What follows is an exercise I want to explore with the congregation and my preaching plan from July 9th until Labor Day.

It is my prayer that I will be able to meet with as many of you as possible in person for a "meet and greet" session so that I can hear your hopes and fears for the impact Emmanuel Community United Methodist will have not just in the greater Menomonee Falls area, but well beyond our community.

Here is what I want you to think about. Imagine that you will be relocated for five years. When you return to EC-UMC after those five years, here are the questions I want to hear your answers to:

- 1. What is one thing you hope has not changed at all?
- 2. What is one thing you hope we will have finally realized has run its course and needs to end?
- 3. What is one new thing you hope we will have finally started to offer or engage in?

#### What is one topic/question you hope the pastor will address in a sermon in your first six months back?

In my ministry I have found these four questions to be a valuable tool for shaping mission and ministry in the local churches I have served. If taken seriously, they reveal first what is the fundamental core of the church family. Second-ly, what things we are using valuable resources on that may no longer be meeting the specific need that may have existed decades ago. Third, the relevant issues our geographic region are currently wrestling with. And finally, how my preaching choices can best assist you to grow spiritually.

I can't wait to get into the pulpit at Emmanuel. Here are my first two sermon series:

#### HOW I BECAME A RECONCILING ADVOCATE

#### The Testimony of Janet Ray

My mother prayed that I wouldn't be left-handed. She grew up at a time when parents, teachers and coaches tried to force her to use her non-dominant hand and punished her when she didn't comply. She didn't want that for me.

Today we understand that being left-handed isn't a moral defect or "sinister" in some way—it's just another attribute of "YOU." In most circles, this trait is accepted without question or discrimination in the 10% of the population who are left-handed. As a teenage Christian, I was solidly in the camp that classified LGBTQ+ people as "unnatural," morally corrupt, and somehow "less than." Looking back, I am ashamed of my prejudice and ignorance, but perhaps my journey to a new perspective can be helpful.

As I attended college in the early 1980's, I met LGBTQ+ people—lovely human beings who worshipped the same Lord and Savior as I. They were worship leaders in campus ministries, Eucharistic stewards in their home parishes, and ministerial candidates. These wonderful, kind, and patient individuals, by their actions and character, upended my long-held prejudices.

In addition, there's been a new body of research about LGBTQ+ people during my lifetime. The idea, popular in the 1990's, that children can be "socialized" to change their sexual orientation has been utterly debunked. Brain imaging technology has shown a

variation in brain structure between homosexual and heterosexual men. I came to understand that (like left-handedness), sexual orientation is part of "YOU." Science exposed my ignorance. But as a generations-long United Methodist and a self-avowed "rule-follower," I was still not ready to imagine defying the UMC Book of Discipline's rules against ordination and in-church wedding ceremonies for LGBTQ+ brothers and sisters. For that, I needed one final persuasion: the Word of God. I don't know Greek or Hebrew, so I am dependent on those who do to provide a translation. Sometimes, translators get it wrong (think of all the portraits of Moses with horns!) and sometimes they project their own biases.

For example, it surprised me to learn that the same word "*phusis*" is used by Paul in both condemning men for having long hair and also for having sexual relations with other men, in 1 Corinthians 11 and Romans 2 respectively. For Paul, both are equally "unnatural," but few would condemn their male pastor for having a ponytail. (For the record, short-haired women are deemed equally "unnatural.") An investigation of similar Scripture and their historical contexts convinced me that the Bible does not mean to deny anyone their Spirit-led calling or the joy of human love.



Ultimately, though, I reflect on my own unworthiness. The Bible, which is (at best) ambiguous and

imprecise about the behavior of LGBTQ+ persons, very clearly and in multiple contexts condemns pride, falsehood, and greed. I know myself to be competitive, to stretch the truth, and to be self-serving. God and/or the United Methodist Church would be wise to set limits on me and my influence.

And yet God's grace prevails. God can use even me. God can use even you. God can use even everyone.

Summer is a great time to "party hearty." That original phrase has morphed into "party hardy." No need to give up the bold, good times implied by "hardy," but come back to the essence of being heart-centered when planning the next big event. Choose ways to have a heart for the earth.

#### Tips for June 2023

Weddings, graduation celebrations, holidays, get togethers—all are important, and all can produce lots of waste. The average American wedding typically dumps 400–600 pounds of trash into landfills. **Choose alternatives to trashing:** Collect and compost food scraps and compostable plates and utensils. Avoid paper and plastic, substituting glass or ceramic dishes, serving platters, and silverware, which can be washed and reused.

**Make a statement with party favors that give back.** Look for something plantable, like herbs, succulents, seed packets. Or display a sign that you've made a donation in your guests' honor, such as planting trees or <u>saving a favorite</u> <u>endangered wildlife creature</u>, perhaps one that fits the theme of the day. Invite additional contributions and send an electronic notice with the amount raised and a thank you for caring for God's creation.

<u>Nix the balloons</u>. They are not biodegradable, and they consequently harm birds and marine life. Also, helium is a nonrenewable gas needed in welding, rocket propulsion, and even scuba diving. Wasting helium in the momentary fun of balloons jeopardizes the other uses. Instead, **add sparkle and fun to the event** with tissue-paper pom poms, garlands from upcycled materials from home, fabric bunting, streamers made from recycled paper, or bubbles.

**Conserve water (save the planet too).** Time watering for early morning or later evening to avoid quick evaporation. Use a broom rather than a hose to clean up outside. Wash the car from a bucket, not from a running hose. Reuse rainwater and household gray water for outdoor plants. Set up a rain barrel.

Enjoy the great outdoors this summer—see and hear God at work! Look up to the sky. Is it blue? Full of clouds? Birds flying? What do you hear? Look out at eye-level. Perhaps you see flowers, colors, a bunny. Look closely at the ground. Be patient. Life is teeming there. Lift your eyes again to the sky. **Pray your praise and gratitude for God's gifts of ecosystems, habitats, and beauty.** 

Stop throwing away trees at every meal. Instead **use cloth napkins** and simply throw them in the wash with another load. Patterned napkins will hide stains and lengthen the usable life of the napkins. Find some distinctive napkin rings to mark each person's and reuse the napkins a day or two before washing. If you visit garage sales, you can likely rescue napkins and rings from being trashed.
