TRINITARIAN QIGONG & LISTENING PRAYER

Improve your physical AND spiritual health this spring! 'Trinitarian Qigong & Listening Prayer' is a way of attuning to God that positions us to experience God first-hand – God's personal voice and transforming energy – using Qigong, a system of intentional movement, breathing, and meditation.

New ECUMC member Steve Reiland is a retired pastor and an instructor in both Qigong and Tai Chi. He has designed a program which ties nine basic Qigong movements with nine inspirational



invitations from the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. This will be a six-week series which may become a meaningful daily practice.

The movements can be performed either standing or sitting, according to your comfort level. When practiced regularly, some studies indicate that Qigong can improve balance, heart health, and stress levels.*

We will meet from 4-5 PM on Sunday afternoons, May 19 through June 23. Wear comfortable clothing and flat shoes or stocking feet in Celebration Hall (enter through those doors.)

The class can accommodate up to 20 participants, so please sign up on the bulletin board or email Janet Ray (JanetR@ec-umc.com) to reserve a spot. If there is additional interest, a second session may be offered in the fall; contact Janet about that option. clean around the corners, and just do any general cleaning. Morning snacks, coffee, and water will be provided as well. Come and rub elbows with new and old





"SEEING RED (in a good way)"



On May 19' Christian churches will be filled with people wearing red. The color on the altar, banners, pulpit, and the pastor's stole will also be red that day.

Why? It is because it is Pentecost Sunday, the day the church remembers and celebrates the coming of the Holy Spirit giving birth to the church. We are taught that the use of the color red in the church during Pentecost is commonly attributed to its association with the flames of the Holy Spirit, which descended upon the apostles and other followers of Jesus Christ as tongues of fire.

Everything changed that day described in Acts, chapter two. With the power of the Holy Spirit, the timid and confused disciples had the proverbial light over their heads go on! Suddenly they were filled with understanding and

courage. Peter boldly proclaimed the resurrection of Jesus Christ. On a single day the number of Christ followers grew by about three thousand people. And as scripture tells us, daily more and more people were being added to that number. Pentecost is the birthday of the church!

In the gospels we read of the birth and resurrection of Jesus, but nowhere in them do we read the words Christmas or Easter. Those titles came later. But we do read of Pentecost in the Bible. That lets us know that there was already a Pentecost being celebrated, but what were they celebrating? They were celebrating a festival called Shavuot, also known as the Feast of Weeks, or The Feast of the Harvest. Long before Jesus was born his Jewish ancestors celebrated this festival which was held fifty days after the Passover (Pesach). The festival remembers and celebrates the giving of the Torah on Mount Sinai. In this celebration the first fruits of the harvest were offered and celebrated. Our Jewish brothers and sisters will observe this two-day mandatory festival from sundown on June 11 through sundown June 13.

While the Christian and Jewish celebrations differ, there are two main things we do celebrate together. Both festivals mark significant moments of revelation and spiritual empowerment that recognizes God's activity in the world, and in our lives. Both also focus on community and communal worship. So, on May 19' we will worship with the community of our local church remembering that we are also worshipping with our Christian brothers and sisters of every expression all around the world.

I hope to see you in worship on the 19th - and don't be afraid to boldly wear red to church that day. With Hope, Pastor Matt






important, how to go a whole lot further.

MORE THAN 3 R's

We think a lot about Recycling, but surprisingly few of our discards are recycled. Before defaulting to Recycle, think about these other "R's", for the sake of creation.



Reuse! Take your reusable bags to the grocery; purchase a reusable water bottle; switch from paper cups to reusable mugs. Before you trash anything, ask yourself if it can be reused as is or repurposed for a new use.

Reduce! Buy in bulk to reduce packaging and emissions from shipping whether to you directly or to the store. Choose "paperless" for bills and newspapers and reduce the trees cut down.

Refuse! Resist the constant pounding of advertising that says buy more and more. Say no to a plastic straw when out to eat and no to a bag for a few items that you can carry easily.

Repair! Learn and use the simple skill of mending. Consult YouTube or a local hardware store for possible fixes for non-working appliances or gadgets. Fight for "Right to Repair" laws for your state.

Restore! Organize for clean-up locally or contribute funds to reforestation efforts across the world.

Regenerate! On a personal level, compost your food and lawn scraps; participate in no mow May, which helps bees and other pollinators.

Rethink! We used to think of the earth's benefits as endless, but they're not. Explore thrift stores before catalogs; purchase from companies that are environmentally conscious; buy local.

Review! Regularly, step back and look critically at your "stuff." Are you a victim of "creep"? Continue asking what else you might do to contribute to the health of Earth and give all a better future.

Recommit! Keep learning, taking more steps, talking to others about your actions on behalf of creation justice. Watch for and celebrate good news. Persist. **Remember!** Remember that you are a beloved child of God. God's first commandment was to care for creation (Genesis 1–2). Let that sacred charge be your guide.

"Do not be deceived; God is not mocked, for you reap whatever you sow . . . So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time,

if we do not give up." Galatians 6:7, 9
According to the Good News Network, 84% of adult
Americans agree with the idea that "what goes
around comes around." Therefore, the same
number also say that they will go out of their way to
"pay it forward" whenever possible.

Respondents reported that they were doing so in a number of ways, including:

Treating their loved ones to something special (50%)
Giving generous tips (48%)



Helping out a neighbor by carrying their groceries or shoveling snow (46%) • Donating money to organizations or charities (40%).

In addition, almost four in ten said they volunteer their time to help friends or family or intentionally support locally owned business.

The average adult engages in five generous acts per week, which adds up to 260 random acts of kindness each year.

Those who pay it forward believe their acts have real effects on more than those on the receiving end. Americans feel better about themselves (49%), their life overall (37%), and feel more confident (22%) when they extend kindness to others.

What acts of kindness can we do this week? Individually or as a congregation? What can we do to pay it forward?
