
meaning in the magical land

A Resolution Worth Keeping: Be in Worship in 2026

January is a season of fresh starts. We make resolutions about our health, our habits, our schedules, and our priorities. Some stick. Many don't. But occasionally, we stumble upon a resolution that doesn't just improve our lives, it shapes our souls.



As we step into 2026, I want to invite you to consider one simple, meaningful resolution: commit to being in worship each week—whether in person or online—as we journey together through the year ahead.

Worship is not about perfect attendance or checking a box. It is about showing up—repeatedly—to place ourselves before God, to hear the Word, to pray, to sing, to wonder, to wrestle, and to be reminded who we are and whose we are.

Worship shapes us over time. Week by week, it forms faith - not through dramatic moments alone, but through faithful presence.

This year's preaching plan is intentionally designed to invite curiosity, honesty, depth, and growth.

We begin January by asking a question many people already carry: "Do You Believe in Miracles?"

Together we will explore what miracles really are, wrestle with familiar stories like Jesus turning water into wine, calming the storm, and healing the blind, and consider what those stories mean for faithful people living in today's world.

As the year unfolds, worship will continue to meet us where we are. In Lent, we will confront the "**Seven Deadly Sins**," not to shame us, but to help us name what pulls us away from God and neighbor. Easter will proclaim again that death does not have the final word. Youth Sunday and Confirmation will remind us that faith is alive and growing in the next generation.

In the months that follow, we will hear "Jesus' Red-Letter Words," explore "A New Vision for the United Methodist Church", and spend the summer with a "Baker's Dozen," getting to know the disciples—the imperfect, ordinary people Jesus chose to change the world. In the fall, our series is "Confirmands ask." In this series the confirmands will ask real, honest questions about faith, prayer, doubt, and denominations. October will focus on faithful

stewardship through "Wesley's Quadrilateral", and November will invite us to listen to God's voice through "Dreams" found in Scripture. Advent will close the year with the promise of "The Gift"—light, justice, hope, and joy.

You do not have to attend every single Sunday to belong here. But making worship a priority—weekly, intentionally, faithfully—creates space for God to work in your life over time. If your schedule allows you to be in the Sanctuary or Celebration Hall, wonderful. If life, health, or travel means joining online, that is worship too.

So, as you make your resolutions this January, consider one that lasts beyond a few weeks. Resolve to show up. Resolve to worship. Resolve to let God shape your year.

I can't wait to walk this journey with you in 2026.


other brave percussionists for all the added parts. A big thanks to Abbey's sister, Sarah Feil, for adding

Farewell 2025!

The Sunday School children of ECUMC finished the last quarter of 2025 in so many wonderful ways!

This Fall we wanted to encourage the children to contributed to our mission to purchase a flock of chicks

through Heifer International. Each flock provides eggs and protein for nourishment, boosts income through sales of extra eggs and offspring, and ensures security for generations through Passing on the Gift. Essentially, the family that receives the flock pays it forward by sharing chickens with other families.

The goal was \$20 for a flock of chicks and for the children to see that a little generosity can go a long way. This gift donation helps provide a family in need with a starter flock of 10 to 50 chicks. It was a slow start, but one child in particular felt such a sense of urgency that he cleaned his entire house to earn \$20. Way to go, Wesley Kostrzewa, and to all of the children that gave a little to give so much! Our next goal is a flock of a dozen ducks.





Thank you to the Matthias Family for hosting the December Club 4/5 event. The group enjoyed a Christmas movie, shared cocoa and snacks, and worked together on a service project. They spread the joy of the season and made Christmas cards for our Community Care members.



Club 4/5 was restarted in 2024 and was awarded a \$1,000 grant from the Wisconsin United Methodist Foundation for 2025. These funds were used for outings and missions each month. Their outreach included Rooted & Rising, the Falls Area Food Pantry, and Meals on Wheels. I am pleased to share that our grant from WUMF was renewed for 2026 for over \$660, and I cannot wait to see what they do this year!

MORE THAN A RESOLUTION: Practicing Faithful Stewardship for the Long Haul

Every January, many of us start the year with good intentions. We resolve to spend less, save more, pay down debt or finally feel less anxious about money. Some of these resolutions stick for a while. Many don't. And it's not because we lack discipline or desire.

The truth is that healthy financial stewardship is rarely achieved through willpower alone.

Getting out of debt, learning to save, practicing contentment, growing in generosity and cultivating gratitude are not quick fixes. They are habits – formed slowly, intentionally and often imperfectly over time. Like prayer, worship and service, faithful stewardship is a spiritual practice that shapes us as disciples.

Scripture reminds us that transformation is ongoing work. Paul writes, "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds" (Romans 12:2). That kind of renewal does not happen because the calendar flips from December to January. It happens when we acknowledge that our relationship with money, possessions and generosity is deeply spiritual –

and that God's work in us unfolds over a lifetime.

For some this might mean seeking help to escape cycles of debt. For others it may mean learning to live with enough, resisting the pressure to accumulate more. For still others it might be discovering the joy of generosity - not just financial giving, but generosity of time, skills, hospitality and compassion.

As individuals and as churches, the invitation at the start of a new year is not simply to make resolutions, but to recommit ourselves to



practices that help us to grow in trust, gratitude and faithfulness. Stewardship is not about perfection. It's about progress – taken one faithful step at a time.

As we close out 2025, we find ourselves reflecting on another year of meaningful and deeply impactful work here at Rooted & Rising. We are deeply grateful for this community, for our partners, and for all of our volunteers and supporters who make our mission possible.

Our work is not easy. Families in Washington Park continue to face steep challenges – housing pressures, financial uncertainty, a legacy of disinvestment and other barriers that can make basic needs feel out of reach. And yet, time and again, your support has helped us show up with consistency, compassion, and dignity. Because of you, we are able to walk alongside families through difficult moments and create pathways toward hope and progress.

Those of you who visit or volunteer at Rooted & Rising see the impact every day. A child learning with confidence in a safe, stimulating, and nurturing environment. A family finding the stability they have long hoped for. A neighbor leaving the Community Food Center with both groceries and a sense of being supported by a staff member or volunteer who genuinely cares.

These moments don't just happen – they are the direct result of your generosity and belief in the important work that our tireless staff, volunteers, and community partners put in on a daily basis. As we look back, we have much to celebrate from 2025 – accomplishments that you helped make possible:

- For the past two years, we have worked hand in hand with a dedicated group of resident leaders and community partners to develop a new **Washington Park Quality of Life Plan**. This plan, a collaborative effort powered by resident leadership and strengthened by donor support, will guide future investments in housing, economic opportunity, public safety, youth engagement, wellness and anti-trafficking efforts, helping to build a stronger neighborhood for generations to come.
- Rooted & Rising's Growing Tree Children's Center earned a **4-Star YoungStar rating**, an achievement made possible through hard work, donor commitment, professional development, and the exemplary care and commitment of our team of educators.
- Rooted & Rising is nearing completion of **four new single-family homes** that will be sold to first-time homebuyers. These homes, funded in part through philanthropic partnerships, will give dedicated early childhood educators the housing and economic stability they deserve in the community they serve.
- Our food security network continues to grow because donors make it possible demand at our **Community Food Center** climbed considerably this year. Every stocked shelf, every full grocery cart, every week without shortages these were direct outcomes of your support.
- Our Supportive Housing Program maintained **100% occupancy** throughout the year, providing security and stability to the 72 families who live in our collection of apartments and townhomes, including families who have successfully transitioned out of previous homeless experiences and are now building new lives with the secure foundation of safe and stable housing. Donor contributions support case management, family-friendly programming, and on-site support that help residents work towards achieving their goals.

When we say we could not do this without you, we mean it.

Your donations, large or small, add up to life-changing impact. You help keep families housed. You help feed neighbors facing food insecurity. You help children learn and thrive.

You help us build a more vibrant, resilient Washington Park. Thank you for choosing to make Rooted & Rising part of your life and part of your giving. Your generosity keeps this mission strong, and your belief in our work fuels our hope for what is possible.
