What Summer Gardens Teach Us

My wife Janet and I are looking forward to the Wisconsin State Fair, August 6–16. We go every year, and there are a few traditions that simply aren't negotiable. Chief among them is a stop at the New Berlin Lions Club Corn Roast. In my humble opinion, they serve the best sweet corn anywhere. You can keep your cream puffs (well... maybe not all of them!), but that perfectly buttered ear of Wisconsin sweet corn is one of the highlights of the fair for us.

August is also a wonderful time for backyard gardens. Here in southeast Wisconsin, gardens reach their peak from mid-August through mid-September. Tomatoes finally turn red, peppers ripen, beans keep producing, and zucchini... well... zucchini seems to have only one goal in life: to take over the world.

In fact, I've heard it said that you should never leave your car unlocked in August because someone might quietly place a bag of zucchini on the passenger seat! Every gardener knows the challenge of finding creative ways to use—or lovingly "gift"—the seemingly endless harvest.

But August gardens teach us more than how to make zucchini bread. They remind us how God grows disciples. The Apostle Paul writes in Galatians 5 that the fruit of the Spirit is "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control." Notice that Paul calls these qualities fruit. Fruit doesn't appear overnight. No gardener plants a tomato seed one week and expects ripe tomatoes the next.

Healthy plants require sunshine, rain, nourishment, and patient care. So do followers of Jesus. We often wish spiritual growth happened instantly. We would love to become more patient after one prayer, more forgiving after one sermon, or more loving after reading a single Bible passage. But God usually works more like a gardener than a microwave. Day after day, often in ways we hardly notice, the Holy Spirit shapes our hearts until we begin reflecting Christ more and more.

Weeds, however, are a different story. Nobody has to cultivate weeds. They seem to grow just fine all by themselves. Left alone, they crowd out the plants we actually want to grow. Bitterness, resentment, selfishness, and worry can do the very same thing in our hearts. If we neglect prayer, worship, Scripture, and Christian fellowship, those spiritual weeds rarely need an invitation.

Jesus said in John 15, "I am the vine; you are the branches... If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit." The secret isn't trying harder—it's staying connected to Christ. As branches receive life from the vine, we receive our life from Him.

So as you enjoy fresh tomatoes, sweet corn, or perhaps discover another mysterious bag of zucchini on your doorstep, let God's creation remind you of His work within you. Celebrate the fruit He has already grown in your life. Pull a few weeds where they're needed. And take heart: the Master Gardener isn't finished with any of us yet. With His patient care, the greatest harvest is still to come.

HOW OUR CHURCH WORKS TO SUPPORT OUR MISSION:

Each month going forward we will provide a brief write-up on a committee or group that works behind the scenes to support our Church's mission: To Imitate Christ Together. It is our hope that these articles will highlight the accomplishments of these groups and may inspire others to participate in the future. Each group will be asked to respond to the same four questions.

This month we are going to highlight the **Sew and Sews**:

What are the goals and the purpose of this group?

This group gets together to cut, sew, and complete quilting projects together. We also make an effort to teach each other new skills. The goal is to give the finished quilts and other handmade items to people across the community in need of them. We also make some items to sell, with the proceeds donated to mission projects in the church.

Who are our members?

There is a core group consisting of Karen Kronschnabl, Dorothy Nienow, Jan Kohlmann, Diane Becker, Mary Dambekaln, Cassie Darnell, and Virginia Patterson. In addition, there is another group of women who volunteer to assist with special projects, like tying the finished quilts. That group's membership changes over time, but it is noteworthy that with their help, the Sew and Sews have been able to complete as many as 10-12 quilts in one day.

How do people volunteer to be part of this group?

The Sew and Sews are always eager to welcome new members. We invite anyone to stop in and check out the group's work when we meet. We don't meet in the summer months, but will resume in September, meeting on the second Monday of each month at 9:30 AM in room 112 (just past the Chapel Lounge). We have the needed supplies, so there's no need to bring anything to join the group. If we need extra volunteers to help out on a special project on a Saturday, (like quilt tying) the need will be posted in the church bulletin ahead of time.

How does this group support the church's mission of imitating Christ together?

Our efforts support the established missions fostered within the church through our fundraisers each year. We make quilts, walker bags, pillowcases, dog beds, lap robes, placemats and more. We have made \$300-\$800 from each of our fundraisers. In addition, our quilts are distributed to various places across the community in an effort to reach out and let others know that ECUMC cares about those less fortunate and/or going through difficult times. These include items sent to the Froedtert Hospital in Menomonee Falls for palliative care and to local hospice centers. We also make donations of walker and wheelchair bags to the Linden Grove Rehabilitation Center. Our dog beds are donated to the Humane Society.

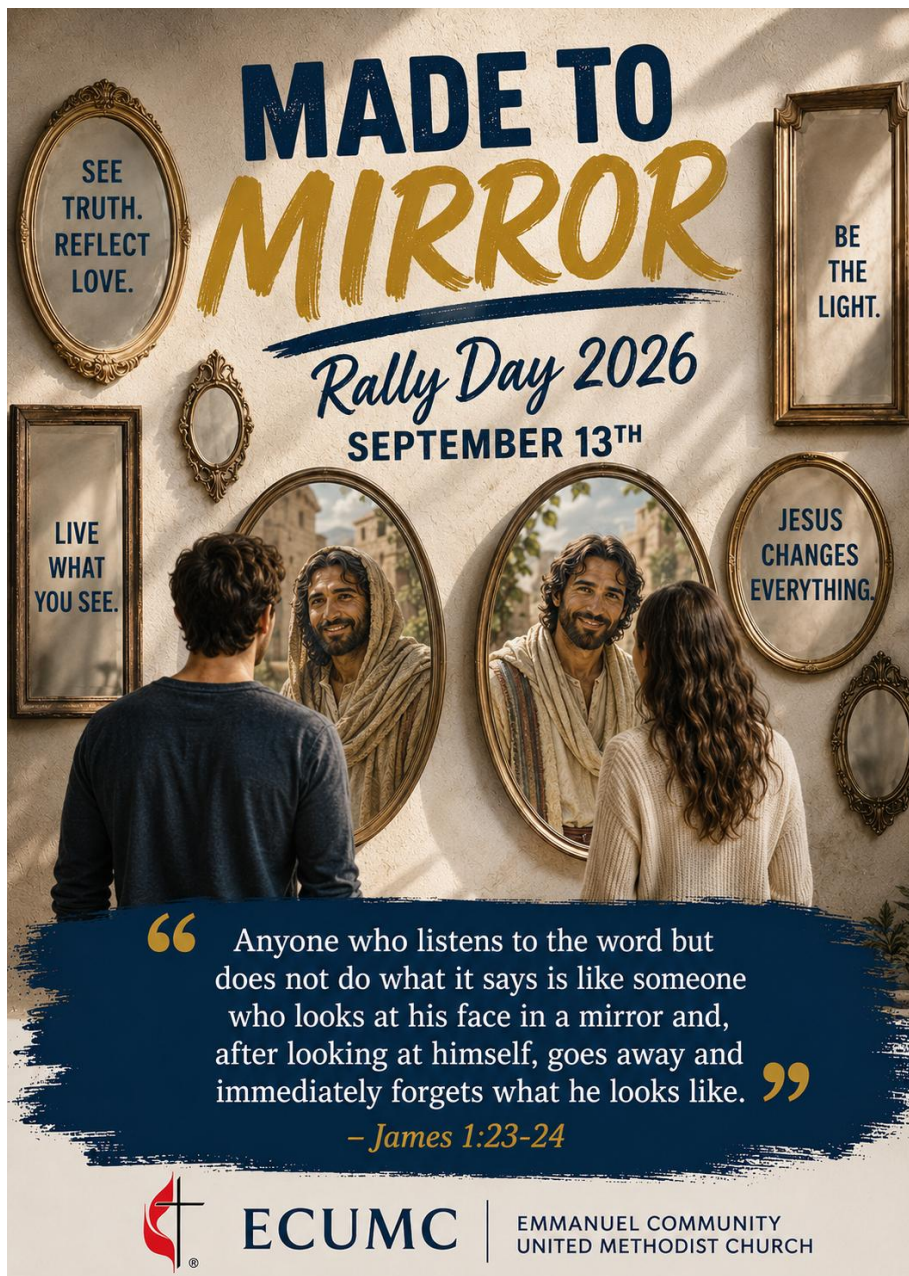
Of course, we'll also have a delicious meal provided, in part, by our Kitchen Klub and, in part, by all of us.

Start with something. Choose one or two easy changes to make, perhaps swapping single-use water bottles for a reusable one or refusing plastic bags. Commit to your action and allow it to lead you to another “something” you can do for Earth.

Work together. Join or create a local effort, perhaps to clean up a waterway or to help plant a pollinator garden. Or donate to a large-scale organization that can use your support to make a greater difference.

Stay ambitious. The goal is big change. Start with a small action, but keep your eyes, mind, and heart open to opportunities that move you—and those with you—closer to what you desire for the sake of Earth and all its inhabitants.

Act for the good of all. Individual actions have a collective impact. For example, when one person installs solar panels or buys an EV, it signals that renewable energy is desirable. When more individuals buy in, that creates demand, which drives down cost, expands investment, creates jobs, and pressures politicians to deliver for their constituents. Apply the same principle to all the places you can act for good.

If a move is on your timetable, flatten any shipping boxes you receive and store them for when you need to start packing. If you’ve just moved, advertise through your networks to find someone who can use the boxes again.

Use and reuse the same natural fiber dryer balls 1,000-plus times instead of single-use, chemical-laden dryer sheets. Think of the difference for your wallet, your health, and the landfill.

For packed lunches for school, purchase foodstuffs

in the largest package available and then divvy them out into reusable containers for the day. Avoid the trash of “snack size” packaging that adds to the landfill, teach your children an alternative to the throw-away culture, and empower them to do something good for the environment.

Change your light habits. To save money and Earth, transition to LED bulbs. Also, engage the whole family in turning off lights when they are not in use. This easy practice is a reminder to care for Earth in other actions too.

Avoid the toxic trio: food, plastic, and heat. Do not cook meals in a sealed plastic bag. Don’t heat up leftovers in plastic in the microwave. The heat releases chemicals from the plastic into the food you consume.

Tree planting season (September–March) is coming. Now is the time to investigate potential tree sources and planting services, including local government, nonprofit foundations, and nursery businesses. Trees pull down carbon from the atmosphere and nourish the soil, provide habitat and food for birds and other pollinators, and give shade in the summer and allow sun in the winter, reducing the need for fossil fuel energy.

Some examples include TVs, computers, laptops, printers, microwaves, kitchen appliances, and even Alkaline batteries that cannot be landfilled (\$1/pound).

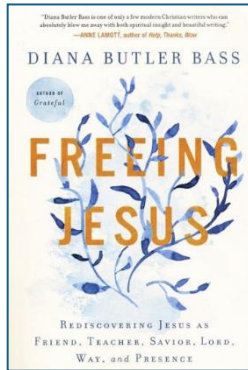

A Stewardship Moment – The Dog Days of Stewardship

August is often called “the dog days of summer.” Depending on who you ask, the phrase has everything to do with hot, humid afternoons when the days seem to blend. Gardens need watering again. Lawns need mowing again. Vacation photos have been shared and school supplies are beginning to fill store shelves. It’s a season that rarely feels exciting – it simply asks us to keep showing up. Stewardship has its own dog days.

Most churches don’t receive their largest gifts in August. Attendance is often lighter. Staff and volunteers are taking vacations. Fall programming hasn’t quite begun. It can be tempting to think, “Nothing much is happening.” But perhaps these ordinary seasons are exactly where faithfulness is formed.

One of my favorite stories comes from a monk who was asked how he stayed joyful after decades of living the same routine day after day. His answer was simple. “Every morning I thank God for the privilege of doing ordinary things.” Preparing meals. Sweeping floors. Greeting neighbors. Praying. None of these activities made headlines, but together they became a life marked by gratitude.

The same is true in the life of the church. Most ministry does not happen in dramatic moments. It happens because someone unlocks the building before worship. Someone prepares communion. Someone visits a homebound member. Someone faithfully gives each month without fanfare. Someone quietly prays for a child or grandchild every day.

Stewardship isn’t primarily about extraordinary generosity. It’s about ordinary faithfulness repeated over a lifetime.

When we learn to be grateful during the ordinary seasons, we begin to recognize that God has been at work all along. The dog days of stewardship aren’t something to endure until the “real work” begins this fall. They are part of the work. They remind us that God’s kingdom is built not only through mountaintop moments but through countless faithful acts that often go unnoticed.

When August winds down, take a moment to thank God for the ordinary rhythms of your congregation. Those simple, faithful habits are the foundation upon which extraordinary ministry is built.
